INVESTMENT OBJECTIVE AND STRATEGY

The UnionBank Peso Balanced Portfolio is a peso-denominated balanced fund that provides investors access to a diversified set of investment instruments in both equities and fixed-income markets. The balanced approach to asset allocation is designed to provide income and potential growth from fixed-income and equity investments but with less volatility than a portfolio invested entirely in equities.

CLIENT SUITABILITY

A client profiling process should be performed prior to participating in the Fund to guide the prospective investor if the Fund is suited to his/her investment objectives and risk tolerance. Clients are advised to read the Declaration of Trust/Plan Rules of the Fund, which may be obtained from the Trustee, before deciding to invest.

Some of the key risks associated with this Fund are listed below:





RELATED PARTY TRANSACTIONS

The fund has bond investments with Aboitiz Equity Ventures; equity investments with Aboitiz Equity Ventures and Aboitiz Power; and time deposits with City Savings Bank and UnionBank of the Philippines amounting to Php 9.94 Mn, Php 775,710, Php 3.14 Mn, Php 6.74 Mn and Php 3.89 Mn respectively. These investment outlets were approved by the Trust Committee. Likewise, all related parties transactions are conducted on an arm's length basis.

OUTLOOK AND STRATEGY

Equity. The market rallied for the third month in a row as it closed 2.3% higher with an intra-month breach of 8,000 before coming back down to 7,800 levels. Net inflows continued and finally brought up the net position back to a positive. Catalysts were mixed over the month given that 1) earnings were generally in-line with only a few notable beats and misses, 2) GDP was unspectacular, 3) President Duterte declared martial law in Mindanao, and Congress passed the first package of the government's tax reform program. Package 1 is most likely the biggest of all the said catalysts with many analysts have indicated this as the biggest driver to bring the market to above 8,000 levels.

We continue to monitor this development and have been rebalancing our portfolios to reflect our view on the situation. We are relatively close to being fully invested but we plan to remain nimble with the ability to deploy into or take profit on liquid names.

Fixed Income. The Philippines GDP printed at 6.4% March of 2017, following a 6.6 percent in the previous quarter. GDP growth was below market consensus of a 6.8%. It was the weakest expansion since the third quarter 2015, as private consumption, investment, and government spending slowed while exports rose further.

Philippines CPI rose 3.1% for the month of May, following 3.4% increase in the April. May CPI was below market expectations of 3.3%. It was the lowest inflation rate since January.

The Bangko Sentral ng Pilipinas held its key overnight borrowing rate steady at 3% on May 11th, 2017 as widely expected. Policymakers kept its inflation forecasts for 2017-2018 unchanged at 3.0 percent \pm 1 percentage point but said upside risks persist.

Philippine Congress also passed the first package of the comprehensive tax reform program of government. The passage allows government to raise an additional P130-150B in revenues that would fund government's increased spending on social services and infrastructure.

Local bond yields experienced a relief rally as the yield curve flattened. Short-term yields were relatively unchanged while longer-dated bond yields were lower mostly by 15-25 basis points. Local yields started to ease as 10Y US treasury yields reached 2.14% coming off from May's 2.4% levels. Yields eased this month on the back of less aggressive hikes from the FED, US treasury yield correction, local inflation and local policy views.
